COURSE DESCRIPTION

Who was Jesus, called the Christ? Christology is often considered the most important topic of Christian theology. The attitude of process theologians to Christology is quite varied. Putting the *Christ* back into *Christ*ian, this course will be a survey and foray of Christological trajectories in process theology. From John Cobb, to David Griffin, and more, we will explore the unique and varied process contributions on questions like: Is Jesus God? How was God incarnate in Jesus? What is the significance of Jesus for process Christians?
